Literacy & Phonics

Design your own wanted poster for a pirate who has

<u>Maths</u>

Make some pirate treasure using tinfoil or something shiny. Ask your grown ups to be a sneaky pirate and steal some of your treasure. Then create a take away sentence using the number of pieces of treasure you started with then how many got taken away to find how many is left. Can you write it in a number sentence like this one -9 - 4 = 6.

With your grown ups, talk about time and when things have happened or will happen using words such as today, yesterday, later, before, tomorrow etc



Design & Make

Can you design and make your own boat, think carefully about the materials you should use and talk to your grown ups about why you have chosen these. Test your boat out—did it float or sink? What would you change if you made another one? Why would you change it?

Talk about the different materials and their properties.



Estimate how many pebbles it will take to sink your boat then put it to the test. Who



had the closest the estimate?
