Physical Development

Read the story of the Paper Dolls, then draw, cut and create your own string of paper dolls. Try to do the cutting yourself. What other paper people or animal string can you create?

Have a go at moving like some of the characters from the different Julia Donaldson books.



Maths

Use playdough to make some 'super worms'. Can you use a ruler to measure them in standard form or another smaller object to measure in a non standard form? Estimate how long you think each worm will be and record your findings. Can you order the worms form the longest to the shortest?

Draw some ladybirds—add the spots - the same on both side, can you count then double them—now investigate doubling.

PSED

Read 'The Smartest Giant in tow'. How did the animals describe the giant at the end of the story and why?

What kind of things can you do to be kind?
What do people do for that is kind?
How do these things make you feel?
Ask your family to answer the same questions.

Literacy & Phonics

Draw a picture of your favourite Julia Donaldson characters. Can you label them then write at least 1 sentence about the character and why you like them?

Can you write a string of rhyming words—which end sound can you think of the most words for?

Can you turn these in to a poem or rhyming story in the style of Julia Donaldson?

Remember to use your phonic knowledge as you write. Listening carefully for all the sounds in the words you are trying to write
Which tricky words can you remember and recognise?
Pop your writing or a photograph of it in you

<u>Design & Make</u>

Go on a walk and collect sticks—use these to construct your very own stick man—you could even make the whole family.

Think carefully about how you attach the sticks—which is the best way to fix them together and which don't work so well?
