Geography	Eastern Europe In Geography, we will look at the climate and physical features of key  places in Eastern Europe, We will compare and contrast human and  explore to		UK Geography: Northern Ireland  During the second half term, we will introduce Northern Ireland and explore the partition between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland before looking at The Giant's Causeway and The Marble Arch Caves.	
History	Anglo-Saxons, Scots and Vikings  We will begin this term long topic by looking at Anglo Saxon settlements, culture and religion before looking at the Scots and the Picts. A large proportion of this topic will be dedicated to the Vikings, where we will explore their raids and invasions, settlements and Danelaw, religion and culture before finishing with the Norman Invasion.			
Art	Design  We will explore the design of art, composition, cut-outs, expressionism, colour and line to create emotion. We will look at the work of Matisse, Munch and Kauffman and arrange a composition using lines to show expression before painting with watercolours.		Monuments of Ancient Rome  During this exciting topic, we will focus our attention on monuments and how they portray power, and the construction of domes and arches. The final piece will be a 3D model.
