Good to be Green

How it works

Good to be green works on a simple traffic light system: green, yellow and red. The children's names are displayed in their class and there is room next to their name for a green, yellow or red card.

Each class has a class tally chart that is clearly visible to the whole class. By the end of the day if a child remains on green, a green tally point is achieved.

The class will agree their class accepted behaviours (Referred to as 'Class Agreement') during the autumn term

Children that get it right

Through making the right choices, the aim for all children is to be on green by the end of each day. If a child remains on green, a green tally point is achieved.

A gold card is given to those that are continually on a green or behave/ engage exceptionally well. Gold cards are also given if a child has been on green all week.

Continually on Green

If a child is continually on green, they could get a gold or platinum card

Gold Card

Sticker on book mark and 2 house

points

Platinum Card

Sticker on book mark and 5 house points. Name gets entered into draw for afternoon tea with Mr Hinkley

Good to be Green

Bookmark completion

Once the bookmark has 21 stickers, parents are invited to school and a certificate is presented in assembly. The children are also sent to the Phase Leader to receive a dip in the box.

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House Points

Each child and staff member has been placed in to the house of: Courage, Ambition, Respect and Excellence. Children work towards obtaining:

> Bronze – 50 house points Silver – 150 house points Gold – 300 house points Platinum – 500 house points

We aim to create a healthy balance between rewards and sanctions with both being clearly specified. Children should learn to expect fair and consistently applied sanctions for inappropriate behaviour. All systems are flexible to take account of individual circumstances.

Yellow and Red cards

If a child breaks a class agreement/core value or shows inappropriate behaviour, a verbal warning is given.

Yellow Card

This is a warning and the child gets the chance to turn this back to green

Red and Purple Card

These are more serious and a sanction is put in place. A restorative conversation is held
